New Entry Requirements for Travel to the United States

As of January 8, 2007, Canadian citizens and citizens of all nations will be required to present a valid passport when entering or re-entering the U.S. by air or sea. This will also apply at land port of entries as of June 1, 2009. For most people, this will mean ensuring that your valid Canadian passport is in order. Visa Requirement Changes for Canada

As of September 27, 2006, Citizenship and Immigration Canada will no longer require that citizens of Estonia have a Temporary Resident Visa in order to enter Canada. At this point in time, Estonia has been removed from the list of countries requiring Temporary Resident Visas in order to visit Canada. Under the provisions of the *Immigration and Refugee Protection Regulations*, all visitors to Canada require a Temporary Resident Visa, except citizens of countries where an exemption has been granted.
